



Amenities.

Facilities: bike storage, car parking (80 spaces), ground to sea launch capability, pontoon, solar panels, air conditioning, and a boatyard and boatshed for R&D and manufacturing activities.

Services: Full-time reception, building manager and 24/7 security.

Food & Beverage: Nearby amenities include cafes, pubs, niche restaurants, a local fish market, and artisan shops in the Hot Walls (an old fortress repurposed for arts and crafts).

Population:


Approximately 215,000 (2021 estimate), making it one of the most densely populated cities in the UK.

Portsmouth has a relatively young population, with a large proportion of working-age residents (about 65%). The city is home to a significant student population due to the University of Portsmouth.









City Overview.

Location: Portsmouth is a port city on the south coast of England, within the county of Hampshire. It's known for being the UK's only island city, located on Portsea Island. It has excellent transport links, including ferry services to the Isle of Wight and continental Europe, as well as strong connections to London (just 90 minutes away by train).

History: Portsmouth has a rich maritime history, being home to the Royal Navy for centuries. Historic sites like HMS Victory, the Mary Rose, and the Portsmouth Historic Dockyard reflect its naval heritage.







Transport.

Transport options include buses, a train station (10-minute walk to Portsmouth Hard which goes direct to London), ferries and hovercraft to the Isle of Wight, and a Millennium Walk along the waterfront from Portsmouth Hard Train station to The Camber.

There's also parking on site.

People & Culture.

Portsmouth is a lively and dynamic city with a blend of traditional maritime heritage and modern urban development.




Architectural Features.

Current State: The building is in good condition with no recent renovations. Originally designed for a single tenant, it has been adapted for multiple occupancy.

Tenants & Local Impact: The building houses 300 specialist employees from two industries: military R&D (Subsea Craft) and engineering (Bar Tech). The presence of these high-skilled, high-salary jobs contributes significantly to the local community.

Portsmouth Historic Dockyard

- **Highlights:** This is the city's premier attraction, home to iconic ships like HMS Victory, HMS Warrior (Britain's first iron-hulled warship), and the Mary Rose, Henry VIII's flagship that was raised from the seabed and carefully preserved.
- **Why Visit:** It offers a fascinating insight into Britain's naval history with interactive exhibits, guided tours and the opportunity to explore historic ships.

Spinnaker Tower

- **Highlights:** Standing 170 meters tall, this iconic structure offers panoramic views of Portsmouth, the Solent, and as far as the Isle of Wight. There's a glass skywalk and viewing decks.
- Why Visit: It's a symbol of Portsmouth's modern redevelopment and provides stunning views, especially at sunset.

Gunwharf Quays

- **Highlights:** A waterfront shopping and leisure complex built on a former naval site. It features high-end retail stores, restaurants, bars, and an entertainment hub, including a cinema and bowling alley.
- Why Visit: Perfect for shopping, dining and relaxing by the water with views of the marina.



Southsea Castle

- **Highlights:** Built by Henry VIII in 1544, this historic fort offers a glimpse into Tudor England and military history. You can explore the castle grounds and enjoy coastal views from its walls.
- **Why Visit:** A significant part of the city's defenses, it's surrounded by beautiful seafront gardens and provides a historical escape by the sea.



D-Day Story Museum

- **Highlights:** Dedicated to the Allied invasion of Normandy in World War II, this museum features personal stories, interactive exhibits and the Overlord Embroidery, a 272-foot tapestry illustrating the D-Day landings.
- **Why Visit:** A deeply moving and educational experience, highlighting Portsmouth's key role in the D-Day preparations.



South Parade Pier & Southsea Beach

- Highlights: Southsea Beach is one of the city's main recreation spots, offering a traditional British seaside experience. The South Parade Pier provides arcades, eateries and seafront entertainment.
- **Why Visit:** Ideal for a family day out or relaxing by the coast, with plenty of spots for beachside walks, ice cream and fresh seafood.



The Round Tower and Square Tower

- Highlights: Two of Portsmouth's oldest fortifications, built in the 15th and 16th centuries to protect the harbour entrance. The Round Tower offers fantastic views of the Solent and the port.
- Why Visit: For a quiet historical exploration with stunning harbour views.



The University of Portsmouth and Eldon Building

- Highlights: The university is a key part of the city's landscape, and the Eldon Building features public exhibitions and events showcasing art, design and innovation from students and local artists.
- Why Visit: A hub for modern art and cultural events.





Local History.

Portsmouth is historically significant, with links to naval history and the oldest dock dating back to the 1500s. The local area, once home to a fish market and key naval operations, is now a modern development known as Gunwharf Quays and hosts the 80th anniversary of the D Day landings.


History.

The Camber is located in Portsmouth, just inside the entrance to Portsmouth Harbour on the South Coast.


The building sits on the site of the former fish market, across from the ferry terminal that links to the Isle of Wight.

It's eco-friendly, featuring solar panels, water harvesting systems, and high EPC ratings. The building plays an active role in the community, including car park support for events and quarterly meetings with local groups. It is located within a conservation area (Old Portsmouth) and has strong connections with the Portsmouth Harbour Authority.























